Hope is alive! Lives are being transformed here at India Rural Evangelical Fellowship (IREF). Children who would otherwise be destined to a life of poverty are being given the tools to change that pattern. They're being given a foundation of faith and a mind of knowledge, inside and outside the classroom. They're getting an education that is a crucial component in breaking the cycle of poverty that has afflicted their families for generations.

No longer must they be resigned to their place on the bottom of the social ladder. They're being empowered by the education they receive. They're being given hope for a new pattern, for aspirations they never knew were possible.

But they're not alone.

IREF's mission of cultural change extends to those all around them — in the rural villages and overlooked places here in southern India. The presence of Christ changes lives, and IREF is doing all it can to bring that spirit of Christ to as many people as possible. Armed with a message of equality, love and hope, IREF is changing lives outside the school system as well.

While the population of the India is just over 1.2 billion, 40%



of those people are living in poverty - the walking-barefootand-living-in-a-mud hut-with-a-palm-branch-roof-and-dirtfloors poverty of the Majority World. They're living below the international poverty line of \$1.25 a day. This is the reality for nearly half-a-billion people here in India.

This is also the reality for every child that enters the doors of IREF. Every single one of the kids that walks through the gates of the school's campus is coming from poverty. This stipulation is a vital component of the larger mission here at IREF, and Scripture is the reason why.



Not only are we called to provide refuge for the poor, the orphans and the "fatherless," but we're also called to provide compassion, dignity and equality.

Most students come from rural villages here in southern India, where dirt floors and palm-leaf roofs are the norm. The education provided to the kids around here is crucial to that mandate. The old cliché holds true — knowledge is power! And these kids are being given something they couldn't get anywhere else...hope for a better future, opportunity for more and most importantly, a foundation of faith.

New Lives in Christ Most young people, who come to study at IREF are from Hindu backgrounds, and would not have heard the truth of Jesus Christ prior to setting foot on our campus. But here the spiritual atmosphere is deep with offerings of daily devotions, scripture reading, Bible messages and Gospel meetings, which transform many. Hearing the messages delivered every week at the IREF church, many students repent of their sins and accept Jesus Christ as their personal savior and Lord, andultimately are baptized.

The 2012-13 school year has brought hundreds of new students to IREF who are hearing the Gospel for the first time in their lives. You can see the Light shining through in these kids' eyes. They are seeing the world in new and exciting ways. The Spirit is moving through IREF and lives are truly changing!

Last week 38 young people were baptized despite heavy rains. When asked if baptisms should be rescheduled to a later date when the weather would be more cooperative, the students asked for not a day to go to waste. They were anxious and ready to start their new lives in Christ. Praise God for the zeal of these new believers. All 38 students were from Hindu tribal backgrounds and each was given a new Christian name to representing the Hindu heritage left behind and the embracing of his/her new identity in Christ.
